CELSTIC TREE OF LIFE - Y Gceden Bywyd • The Ancients envisioned the entire cosmos in the form of a tree whose roots grow deep in the ground, branches reaching high into the heavens. In this original design, the interlacing branches symbolize the Celtic belief in the continuity of life, a circle with no beginning and no end. Reverence for trees is at the heart of Celtic spirituality. Druids had their teaching centers in the midst of oak groves, and the words for wood and wisdom are similar (Welsh: gwydd and gwyddon). The Oak is particularly revered by the Druids whose name is related to Dair the Celtic name for the oak, and dair - the opening to the Mysteries. The sacred oak represents strength, wisdom and endurance, and Druids may have referred to those with 'Knowledge of the Oak'. The Celtic healers and priests encoded their deep knowledge of trees and herbs into an ancient cryptic tree alphabet - an Ogham cipher - Beth Lios-Naun. The acorn represents fertility, renewal, and new beginnings.



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
