JERRY ANDERSON is a more recent convert to railroad illustration, originally having a fascination with flight and flying machines since childhood. A lifelong native of Pennsylvania, he spent his youth building hundreds of airplane models and making thousands of drawings of all types of aircraft. While Jerry pursued a career in aviation, his hobby of drawing and painting pictures of aircraft expanded into a part-time business. 

Spending hours drawing and coloring was a daily occurrence and eventually became the passion that he wanted to pursue as a professional. J. CRAIG THORPE grew up riding streetcars and trains in Pittsburgh and was smitten by the narrow gauge. He melded that interest with promotional art for the East Broad Top and Rockhill Trolley Museum, and his senior project at Carnegie Mellon was the official EBT brochure. After working for architects and a masters program in the east, Thorpe relocated to Seattle and specialized in architectural art. Amtrak's request to use a station painting on its 1993 calendar opened the door to national exposure. His work has been commissioned by the White Pass & Yukon, Union Tank Car Co., GE, transit and museum operations and private collectors. DAVID TUTWILER holds the honor of having his paintings hang in some of America's most prestigious collections, both public and private, including the collections of the Pepsi Cola Co., the National Railway Historical Society, and the Steam Collection of Valparaiso University. He began painting at the age of 14, with a scholarship to the Art Institute of Chicago, later graduating from the American Academy of Art.
