



GAIA GREEK GODDESS OF EARTH

Gaia in Greek Mythology is the primordial Goddess of the Earth, also known as the "Great Mother" or "Mother Earth". Born from Chaos, Gaia encompasses the planet and is the source of all life. HECATE GREEK GODDESS OF MAGIC AND WITCHCRAFT

Hecate, in Greek Mythology, is the Goddess of Magic, Witchcraft, the Night, and Crossroads. Her origin is mysterious and ancient, and some accounts place her as the daughter of the Titans Perseus and Asteria. Unlike other Olympian gods, Hecate has roots in both the world of the living and the dead, granting her unique and feared power.

Often depicted with three bodies or three heads, Hecate symbolizes her ability to see in all directions and her dominion over the earth, sky, and the underworld. She is the guide of spirits, capable of crossing the boundaries between the mortal world and the realm of Hades.

ASTERIA GREEK GODDESS OF STARS AND CONSTELLATIONS

Asteria, in Greek Mythology, is the Goddess of Stars and Constellations. Daughter of the Titans Cronus and Rhea, Asteria belongs to the ancient generation of pre-Olympian gods.

Her name means "starry" and her celestial domain connects her with the night and cosmic power. Seen to guide the mortal world, Asteria is also known for her influence over dreams and nocturnal prophecies.

One of the most famous legends of Asteria tells that, to escape with her night and cosmic power, she transformed into a star and became the constellation of the Boötes constellation. Asteria's herald, the owl, was also associated with the constellation of Cygnus, which gave evidence to the story of Asteria's transformation into a star.
